

COURSE DESCRIPTION LEVEL 1:

Clinical internship is the practical-application portion of the Emperor's College curriculum. Level one is the entry level for internship. This level focuses strongly on general professionalism, patient and practitioner communication and safety, time management, and intake skills. Interns should be able to complete a basic patient intake: gather pertinent information, take western medical vitals, and be able to identify any high risk or red flag patients. Interns should also be able to associate general findings with the eight principals, and have a basic understanding of how to develop a diagnosis based on findings. Tasks at this level are accomplished with prompting and guidance from both main supervisors and technical supervisors, and interns function with a high level of direct supervision more than 80% of the time.

LEARNING OBJECTIVES

Level 1 demonstrates the ability to:

- Present oneself in a professional manner to all patients, students, staff and faculty through appropriate dress, communication and timeliness.
- Prepare and clean treatment rooms according to Clinic policies and CNT.
- Navigate themselves in the clinic in an efficient manner with awareness to all policies, procedures, paperwork and assignments required for each shift.
- Recognize and maximize the opportunity for learning, and implement constructive criticism.
- Collect relevant patient information and conduct a thorough intake including:
 - Chief complaint
 - o Additional symptoms
 - History
 - o LMF
 - Western medical vitals: BP, HR, temperature, height, weight
 - Medications
 - Pain scale if applicable
 - (Orthopedic exams if applicable)
 - O TCM pulses basic descriptors or overall impression for each side
 - O TCM tongue includes basic description: body shape, color, coating
- Communicate relevant information to supervisor
- Associate symptoms with basic eight principle theories
- Locate points according to primary meridians and some additional commonly used extra points
- Display knowledge about aforementioned points in regard to general usage/indications, or contraindications
- Display basic knowledge of herb categories, individual herbs and common patent herbal formulas

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

I. Grading: The intern is expected to progress through the initial stages of internship with grades reflective of a novice level based on the following clinical rubric. It is expected that the intern will maintain the standards set by the pre-clinical exam in regard technical aspects including but not limited to point location, needling techniques, ethics, etc., yet may rely on the supervisor and technical supervisor more heavily during the initial weeks of internship and accumulate knowledge and experience that will allow for greater independence as the intern progresses to the next level. Interns are expected to score a minimum of "novice" on the clinical rubric in all competencies with the exception of safety, communication, and ethics which should all be scored at a level of "guided" (3) or higher. If an intern should score below "novice" level in any aspect, the Dean of Clinical Education will intervene and determine if remediation is required.

- II. <u>Competencies</u>: Refer to Clinic Handbook for specific competencies and expectations for intern levels.
- III. <u>Attendance</u>: Interns are required to clock in and out on time for each shift and remain in the clinic for the duration of the shift. This is a 12-week course a total of 50 hours on-shift is required for completion. All absences must be made up by the end of the third week of the following quarter. A maximum of three absences are allowed in order to receive credit. Refer to Clinic Handbook for absence policies and make up shift procedures.
